#### Parent Governor Election – Electronic Ballot Process

Further to my letter notifying you of one parent governor vacancy, we have received 3 nominations and therefore will need to undertake a ballot. We would like to inform you that the election for our **Parent Governor** position will be conducted **electronically** this year. Moving to an online voting process helps us make the election more efficient, environmentally friendly, and accessible to all families.

There are 3 candidates who are standing for election and their names and supporting statements can be read at the bottom of this letter. The candidates have been listed in alphabetical order

Voting will remain open until **9am Thursday 23<sup>rd</sup> October 2025**, after which the results will be counted and shared with all parents.

If you experience any issues accessing the ballot or would prefer a paper copy, please contact the school office by Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> October 2025 so that alternative arrangements can be made. Should alternative arrangements be required, the deadline remains as stated above.

Voting is open to ALL parents with pupils in Reception – Y6 and have parental responsibility. Please note that you are only entitled to ONE vote per parent and we ask you to add YOUR full name so that we are able to verify eligibility and check for multiple votes.

This information is required to ensure only 1 vote per parent is placed and can only be viewed by the returning officer, who will be our School Business Leader, Sally-Anne Boyes and an independent witness who will be appointed by our Governing Board.





The candidate with the highest number of votes is elected. In the event of a tie, the candidate with the youngest pupil on roll at the school will be deemed to have been elected.

We value your participation in this important process — Parent Governors play a vital role in representing the views of families and helping to shape the strategic direction of our school.

#### Personal Statement:
